The Historic Lincoln School was a leader in Alabama and much of the South in the struggle of African Americans to obtain a first-rate education and equal rights. Thanks to your steadfast support over the years, the Lincoln School Legacy is alive and well.

During the past few years, together we have accomplished much. A few of these follows:

1. Museum Partnership with the National Park Service; 2.Major repairs and upkeep to Classroom Addition Building; 3. Alabama Historical Commission supported the nomination of the whole campus as a "Historic District", final approval for the National Register of Historic Places is pending; 4.Received a \$5,000 grant to help fund the Gym Rehabilitation Historic Structures Report; 5. Since 2010 awarded 43 competitive scholarships totaling \$48,000 ranging from \$1,125 to \$625; 6 Replaced the Auditorium Curtains; 7. Established a \$ for \$ "Preservation Matching Fund" to support campus preservation/Repairs

Ahead of us lies the challenge of rehabilitation of the gymnasium. The recently completed Historic Structures Report provides us with a roadmap to meet this challenge. Phillips Memorial Auditorium, the centerpiece of the campus, requires column and roof repairs along with heating and air condition unit replacement. Organizational Capacity Building is underway, including adding grant contract management.

LINCOLN SCHOOL CAMPUS 2016-2017 MAJOR PRESERVATION MAINTENANCE AND BUILDING – UPKEEP REPAIRS

Classroom Addition Building (Total Spent -\$48,830.23)

- Installed a commercial sloping metal roof on Museum Assembly Room and the two porches
- Painted interior walls and exterior doors and woodwork

- Replaced floor tiles in Classrooms #2 and #3

NATIONAL REGISTER SITE NOMINATION

The National Register of Historic Places is the official Federal list of districts, sites, buildings, structures, and objects significant in American history, architecture, archeology, engineering, and culture. These contribute to an understanding of the historical and cultural foundations of the Nation.

On April 27, 2017, the Alabama Historical Commission National Register Review Board Committee made the recommendation that the entire Lincoln School Campus was eligible for listing in the National Register of Historic Places as the Lincoln School Historic District/Site. The eligibility determination recommendation was based on the school's statewide significance in promotion of African American education, as well as a property significantly associated with the Civil Rights Movement in Perry County, Alabama, and the Campus' archaeological potential. The recommendation has been forwarded to the United States Department of the Interior/National Park Service for further action. The decision is pending; therefore, as information becomes available, it will be forwarded to you.

Note: The goal of the project is to achieve National Register recognition for the entire Lincoln School campus site. Presently, the campus is a historic site, but only Phillips Memorial Auditorium has both Alabama Register of Landmarks and Heritage listing and National Register of Historic Place recognition. The Gymnasium and the Classroom Addition Building (including the Museum) that are contributing resources of the Auditorium have only Alabama Register of Landmarks and Heritage recognition.

LINCOLN MEMORIAL MUSEUM

Lincoln Memorial Museum is an integral component/part within the structure of the organization of the Lincolnite Club, Inc. The purpose of the Museum Partnership Agreement is to establish a basis for cooperation, assistance, and collaboration between the National Park Service and the Lincolnite Club, Inc. to achieve mutual goals of the two parties as stated in the Non-exclusive Agreement and to thereby further upgrade and develop Lincoln Memorial Museum to comply with state and national museum standards.

2017 GRANTS REPORT

BLACK BELT COMMUNITY FOUNDATION

The Black Belt Community Foundation awarded the Lincolnite Club, Inc. a \$500 museum grant that defrayed the cost of Mrs. Willie Mae Crews participation in the 2017 Alabama Museum Association Annual Conference in Cullman, Alabama, March 5-7, 2017. Mrs. Crews is the Lincolnite Club, Inc. National Vice President, Vice Chair of the Trustees, and a volunteer worker of Lincoln Memorial Museum.

ALABAMA HISTORICAL COMMISSION 2018 CAPITAL ENHANCEMENT GRANT

The Lincolnite Club, Inc. is the recipient of a \$5,000 (2018) Alabama Historical Commission Capital Enhancement grant to partially fund a Phillips Memorial Auditorium Project to promote the preservation, maintenance, and accessibility of the Auditorium. The project includes the following job components: (1) repairing and painting porch columns; (2) tree service to remove hazardous deteriorating trees and trim others to provide safe access to and around the Auditorium and Classroom Addition Building; (3) replacement of the North unit of the airconditioner system; (4) exterior painting of the woodwork; (5) roof repairs; (6) cleaning and repairing the campus name monument, located north of the Auditorium; and (7) repairing, cleaning and ceiling cracks of the Auditorium's front steps and adjacent concrete extensions.

The Lincolnite Club, Inc., in addition to an initial \$5,000 matching pledge, will fund the balance of the project (\$30,000), as approved by the Executive Committee, in compliance with our commitment to the AHC to complete the entire project as proposed.

NATIONAL PARK SERVICE FY 2017 PRESERVATION AFRICAN AMERICAN CIVIL RIGHTS GRANT During the month of September 2017, the Lincolnite Club, Inc. submitted a National Park

Service African American Civil Rights Preservation Grant Application for the stabilization phase of the Rehabilitation of Lincoln High School Gymnasium: hazardous materials testing and abatement, replacement of the roof, windows, and doors, and structural repairs to make the building watertight to stop further deterioration. The grant is pending; therefore, additional information will be forwarded to you as it becomes available.
